21 Session 2: Standards Division update

- 22 Chief of Standards, Bastian Buck, provided the following update on the work of the Standards
- 23 Division:
- An overview of the main activities of the Sector Program: Oil and Gas / Coal / Agriculture,
- 25 Aquaculture, and Fishing completed pilot projects in the public domain, all available in English
- on the GRI website and now working on translation; Mining content development is underway;
- 27 Food and Beverages / Textiles and Apparel currently in a holding pattern, ramping capacity on
- the staffing side; Banks / Insurance / Asset Management draft project proposal preparation is
- 29 underway.
- Sector Standard Project for Mining status update exposure draft to be finalized by the end of the

- GRI Topic Standard Project for Biodiversity status update: 4th TC meeting held 14 June 2022; 5th
 TC meeting 12 September 2022; final TC meeting (fatal flaw check) to be held 25 October 2022;
 The revision work is scheduled for GSSB approval of the Exposure draft 17 November 2022. A
 launch event for the exposure draft will be for the week of COP 15 Montreal in December. Public
 exposure period from December 2022 February 2023. In cooperation with GRI Regional hubs,
- 43 Global Q & A workshop sessions will be held as part of the PCP Jan/Feb 2023.
- GRI Topic Standard Project for Labor status update: GSSB approved the project proposal on 7
 July 2022; approval of nominated TC members scheduled for the present meeting; press release
 scheduled for the week of 19 September 2022; a call for experts to the Advisory Group issued in
 September; the 1st TC meeting takes place 22 September and the 2nd TC meeting 1 December.
 - GRI Topic Standard Project for Climate Change status update: Climate topic is prioritized in GSSB Work Program 2020-2022; Margherita Barbieri joined GRI as of 1 September 2022 and will lead the project; the preliminary stage consists of stakeholder engagement and network building, and input from the research team; draft project proposal to be submitted for GSSB approval in the December meeting. There are ongoing discussions on how the GRI project can be aligned withthe climate work of the International Sustainability Standards Board (ISSB) and EFRAG.

Session 3: Update Labor-related

55 Standards

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- 56 Director Standards, Harold Pauwels, provided the following update on the Labor-related Standards:
- The project proposal was approved in July by the GSSB. An invitation was sent to the GRI Board 58 and Stakeholder Council to comment on the proposal – no comments were received. The final 59 approval of the unchanged project proposal is reserved for this meeting.
- The TC comprises two representatives nominated by the International Labour Organization (ILO), two representatives of the International Trade Union Confederation (ITUC) and the Global Unions Federations (GUFs), and two employer representatives from the International Organization of Employers (IOE).
 - A call for experts to be appointed to the Advisory Group (AG) to support the TC in the content development process will be launched with specific provisions during the week of 19 September.

- Director Standards, Harold Pauwels, provided the update for the new GSSB Work Program: 77
- 78 The draft Work Program is being prepared for the GSSB meeting in October.
- 79 Based on GSSB feedback, the draft Work Program will be amended and shared for approval 80 in November to submit for public consultation.
- At the end of November, a public consultation period will commence with Stakeholder Council and 81 82 GRI Board to provide feedback and comments and suggest new topics.
- 83 The final Work Program will be submitted to the GSSB meeting in February 2023 for final 84 approval.
- 85 The new Work Program will be based on internal and external stakeholder feedback to the GSSB. 86 GSSB public consultations, and Sector Program recommendations to the GSSB.
- The Work Program covers the GSSB list of priority projects for the next three years, which include 87 the review of existing Topic Standards, the development of new Topic Standards, the 88 89 development of new Sector Standards, a research program for both Sector and Topic Standards, a revision process with linkages between Sector and Topic Standards and all translations.
- 90 As part of the Work Program agreement with the GSSB, cooperation with key stakeholders like 91 the ISSB and EFRAG will be included.
- 92 GSSB's strategic decision will set the pace to develop Sector Standards for at least 40 priority 93 sectors with a periodic review cycle and initiate new Topic Standards development.

95 Head Sector Program, Mia d'Adhemar, presented the Sector Standards work pipeline as follows:

- The basis for the Sector Standards Work Program will be the approved priority list.
- The work will be carried out sequentially, considering refinements to the scopes of sectors and of Sector Standards already developed. Minor refinements to the scope of the sectors listed will be incorporated into the prioritization list at key moments.



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• It is estimated that four Sector Standards projects can be delivered simultaneously once the sector team is fully resourced. In the near term, the three financial sectors planned to be delivered as a single project will enable the simultaneous development of six Standards. The organizational structure will be reconsidered towards the end of 2023 and the beginning of 2024 to identify opportunities to scale the team further to deliver more projects. Current planning enables the commencement of all Group 1 sectors by the end of the current Work Program.

Harold Pauwels provided the following points on the Topic Standards and Research work pipeline:

- The Biodiversity project is ongoing. The Labor project will start based on the approval during this meeting. The Climate Change project is in the draft proposal for approval in December.
- Biodiversity will be published in 2023, and the balance of the projects will continue to later publication.
- The aim is to have 31 Topic Standards under revision by the end of the 2023-2025 Work Program.
- Research for Sector Standards continues. Research for Topic Standards development is
 to be discussed in line with the Work Program. New topics requiring research include
 Data Protection and Privacy, Public Policy, and Anti-competitive Behavior.
- The GSSB will identify priorities for developing new Topic Standards based on stakeholder feedback from various sources.
- Stakeholder input presentations to the GSSB are being reviewed and analyzed. These
 will be presented as input to the Work Program for further discussion in the October
 meeting.

Session 5: Presentation by IFC on

Transparency related to Land

Acquisition and Resettlement

- 127 The Chair welcomed guest speaker Diana Baird, Global Social Lead at the International Finance
- 128 Corporation (IFC), to present the following points on land acquisition and resettlement as inputs to the
- 129 GSSB work program 2023-2025:



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- IFC Performance Standard 5: Land Acquisition and Involuntary Resettlement (PS5) is a key reference in GRI 11 and GRI 12, and is expected to be in GRI 14.
- PS5 applies to cases where land is acquired through expropriation or compulsory legal
 procedures, lands acquired through negotiations with owners where expropriation is possible, and
 involuntary restrictions on land use or access to resources for local communities.
- Project design, the first key objective of PS5, includes exploring feasible alternative project
 designs and considering impacts on the poor and vulnerable.
- PS5 also includes community engagement and grievance mechanisms as a part of its guidance,
 with reference to decision-making processes, transparent disclosures, and additional provisions
 for consultations with indigenous peoples.
- Community engagement guidelines follow PS1: Assessment and Management of Environmental
 and Social Risks and Impacts.
- PS5's recommendations on resettlement and livelihood restoration planning include conducting a
 census, developing a resettlement framework with room for expansion, and monitoring
 implementation.
- IFC also outlined key aspects of displacement, compensation, and benefits, such as types
 including landowners and land users, their economic dimensions, and the physical ramifications
 of resettlement.
- Distinctions and special considerations are drawn between economically and physically displaced
 persons.
- Private sector responsibilities under government-managed resettlement require active
 collaboration among stakeholders, livelihood restoration planning, and additional measures to
 target gaps, including cash compensation and evaluation of the process.
- Further information was provided about potential indicators, including the number of persons displaced, the amount of land impacted, and the number of displaced persons with livelihoods restored.
